LEONIE CLYNE OAM on response to the Honorary Award of Doctor of the University

I welcome into the heart of this University, today's Graduands from Business, Government and Law, and Humanities and offer my sincere congratulations on this special occasion, during which I have the privilege to have been asked to say a few words to you as you embark on the next exciting stage of your careers.

After leaving school, I enrolled as a first-year student at Flinders University in February 1973 along with Robert, whom I married a year later. Today, we are here to enjoy and reflect on an amazing journey and the significant part this University played in our lives.

Forty-nine years ago, a young University was building and forging its reputation and the campus was physically a very different place, particularly with the magnificent developments in recent years and those just announced by our Vice Chancellor. But Flinders' ethos of inclusiveness, excellence and being 'brave', has not changed. Although offered placements elsewhere, we wanted the best of tuition and to be guided by outstanding academics in the fields in which we had chosen to study.

Although I studied psychology and science, it was not to be the professional path I followed, but my studies shaped my thinking for business ventures ahead. Learn from failure, it can be a remarkable 'teacher'. Knowledge is a key to success. So is innovation and adapting to change. Like Flinders University, you must always grow and evolve.

Treat staff, clients, customers and suppliers respectfully and honestly, as they are all important components of the life force of a business. This is called integrity.

Know your strengths but understand your weaknesses, and look after yourselves. Treasure your health and wellbeing. A good work-life balance, is essential.

As a proud alumnus, I warmly thank Flinders for my wonderful journey filled with opportunities, challenges, memories and friendships, and I encourage our graduands of today, to take the opportunity to remain engaged with this wonderful University
