Community Engagement

Flinders University and Professor Jaqui Hughes are making significant contributions to advancing kidney knowledge in the Torres Strait with a successful research symposium held on Waiben in August. Community leaders, health service providers and community members attended to discuss current research activity, outcomes of previous research and provide input to future research.

Flinders University was invited to attend the bi-annual Winds of ZENADH Cultural Festival in September and hosted an information booth sharing eGFR3 Kidney Health Study information and other Flinders University research activity in the Torres Strait. The booth was a local point of community engagement and knowledge exchange.

eGFR3 Study in Kalgoorlie

eGFR3 Study team members Diana Mosca and Vanya Webster travelled to Kalgoorlie in October to meet with previous eGFR participants. The eGFR3 Study team partnered with Bega Garnbirringu Health Service to conduct face to face data collection in a familiar accessible location.

eGFR3 Study in Galiwin'ku

The eGFR3 Study team travelled to Galiwin'ku in September and completed face to face data collection for the region. The eGFR3 Study team thank Miwatj Health Services, Community Based Researcher Veronica Gondarra, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Community Governance Group members Wanamula Gondarra and Rrapa Dhurrkay for supporting the eGFR3 Study in Galiwin'ku.

The eGFR3 Study team learnt from Senior Elders and leaders about the strength, wisdom and orthography used to share health knowledge with community in the program *Marrtji Limurr Rrambanj Gunga'yun Yolŋu'-yulŋuny Mala* (*Walking together to support Yolŋu people for good health*). This is beneficial when sharing the knowledge generated by the eGFR3 Study.

Prof Jaqui Hughes led a group to attend the 60th Australian and New Zealand Society of Nephrology (ANZSN) Congress in Perth. The group supporting Flinders included 14 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander kidney health champions, including team members from the eGFR3 Study, Community Based Researcher Deidree Whap, and ATSICGG Co-chair Sian Graham. A culturally safe space was created by the group, to connect with delegates and exchange knowledge focusing on the stewardship of renal care. Prof Jaqui Hughes and Sian Graham were awarded the ANZSN 2025 Rural Science Award for their abstracts: *'Partnering through governance- eGFR3 Study'* and *'What our families & Communities must know- eGFR3 Study'*.
