There's quite a bit happening on the HDR front. The College HDR Committee are seeking to establish a peer mentoring scheme for HDRs, with students potentially acting as both mentors and mentees. The annual HDR conference is also being planned for Monday the 20th of September. This year, the conference is titled: Being, becoming: Well-being, education and justice in a changing world. Both activities add to our research culture, and I encourage you and your students to participate.

Dr Deb Agnew and **Associate Professor Shane Pill**, together with Dr Kathryn Jackson and Dr Louisa Matwiejczyk (CNHS), in partnership with Oceania Hockey Federation and Family Planning Australia have been awarded **\$175,500** of a \$600,000 grant from the **Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade**. It is an Australian sports partnership program grant to deliver sport for development projects in PNG and Vanuatu over the next two years.

Dr Jane Jarvis, Dr Julie McMillan, Associate Professor Kerry Bissaker and Dr Carol Le Lant won the \$15,000 AASE National Research Award Grant to support their project, *Piloting an inclusive school self-assessment instrument for the Australian context.*

Dr Helen McLaren and Dr Michelle Jones started pro-bono work for Life Without Barriers nearly four years ago, with a view to building a collaboration for research. In 2020 they were about to sign a contract for evaluation of the Mockingbird Family Model™ (foster care model) implementation in Adelaide, but COVID-19 hit and everything stopped. Now so excited, as the work has come back and it is no longer a simple evaluation. Helen and Michelle will be completing quasi-experimental research across New South Wales and South Australia, with a view to adding to the body of international knowledge of the Model. They will be working in collaboration with scholars of the Model in UK and USA. Funding amount: \$85,000

Dr Helen McLaren and **Dr Michelle Jones** were awarded \$24,000 from **Community Development**, **Education and Social Support** (CDESSA) and will be co-designing with CDESSA and evaluating their health and wellbeing promotion program for multicultural families in the area of parenting and relationships. With other collaborations in the wind, this is the beginning of a growing stakeholder collaboration.



- Dr Carmela Bastian and Professor Sarah Wendt have been nominated for the 2021 SA Child Protection Award for Excellence in Child Protection Research. The winners will be awarded at the 2021 SA Child Protection Awards breakfast in September.
- The Lifetime Achievement Award awarded by the International Society for Justice Research was awarded to Emeritus Professor Norm Feather at its meeting in Lisbon in July. The biennial conference was conducted electronically and Norm Feather accepted the prestigious award in a video in which he described some of his main contributions to social psychology and to other areas of psychology over a long and productive career.
- Professor Stella Vosniadou received the 2021 Career Achievement 'Oeuvre' Award at the Awards Ceremony of the biennial Conference of the European Association for Research on Learning and Instruction (EARLI) on 24 August 2021. The Oeuvre Award is presented at each Biennial EARLI Conference to a living recipient, in recognition of outstanding achievements and excellence in scholarship and research in the field of learning and instruction.





Athlete Transitions into Retirement: Experienced in Elite Sport and Options for Effective Support

Athlete Transitions into Retirement is a comprehensive discussion of the various aspects of athlete retirement. With different experiences from a variety of sports it will highlight the similarities and differences across the breadth of athletes from different places and the nuances of place and culture presented side by side for a textured picture of the experience of athlete retirement.

The book features chapters from authors in the United Kingdom, United States of America, Denmark, Canada and Australia thus presenting global insights into athlete retirement transitions. One of the benefits of this book is the insights are grounded in empirical research and provides recommendations for how to support athletes during a time where they are most vulnerable. Covering various levels of competition including college, elite and second tier competitions, this book offers a proactive approach to caring for athletes during the transition out of sport and features a foreword by 3 time Irish Olympian Gearoid Towey.

This book came to fruition through an invited presentation at Liverpool John Moores University where a group of academics with a common interest in athlete retirement and well-being got together to discuss the relevant issues. It is unique as it is solely dedicated to retirement transitions in sport and with each chapter containing a specific section on the practical implications of the research it will be useful for both academic audiences and practitioners who are working to support athletes who are transitioning out of elite sport.


Queer Entanglements: Intersections of Gender, Sexuality, and Animal Companionship

Damien W. Riggs, Shoshana Rosenberg, Heather Fraser, and Nik Taylor

Queer Entanglements provides the first comprehensive account of the intersections of lesbian, gay, bisexual, queer, trans, and non-binary people's lives with the lives of animals.

Exploring diverse topics such as domestic violence, grief following the loss of an animal, veganism, cruelty-free makeup products, Pride events, and community activism, the book offers a theoretical and empirical basis for understanding the contexts that bring together human and animal lives.

By using real-world examples, it provides a lively and engaging view of what it means to think about the connections between animal and human lives, even when human experiences operate at the expense of animal wellbeing.



This critical, intersectional, and interdisciplinary perspective on human-animal relations will be of interest to scholars and students in human-animal studies, psychology, sociology, social work, and cultural and gender studies.
