This month has seen its share of good news. The University recently initiated a new fellowship scheme to recognise outstanding research achievement. In the inaugural round of awards, seven academics received the title of Matthew Flinders Professor. Four of these were awarded to academics in CMPH, two in CSE and one in CNHS. Only one person received the title of *Matthew Flinders*

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CORRECTION: Professor Damien Riggs is a co-Chief Investigator on an CAD\$803,250 grant funded by the Canadian Institute of Health Research for the project *Growing up trans: An international longitudinal qualitative investigation of trans youth and family well-being.* The project is led by A. Pullen Sanfaçon of the University of Montreal with V. Barras, A. Carlile, N. Chadi, L. Chiniara, S. Ghosh, S. Katz-Wise, W.J. Edward Lee, D. Medico, and F. Suerich-Gulick. Professor Riggs will receive approximately AUD\$82,000 of the funding.

Dr Emma Kemp and **Associate Professor Lisa Beatty** received a **\$21,041 Flinders Foundation Health Seed Grant**, for the project *Impact of socioeconomic and geographic disadvantage and digital health literacy on digital health engagement in people with cancer: A participatory, qualitative exploration of user needs and experiences.*

Associate Professor Shane Pill was awarded **\$22,000** from the **University of Canberra** for a Collaborative approach for quality physical education in early childhood using a personalised system of instruction.

Associate Professor Shane Pill and Dr Kym Williams were awarded \$24,060 Game on Grant from the Office of Recreation and Sport for the *Active Gamers Evaluation* in collaboration with Meta, Adelaide FC, and AFL Max.

Professor Damien Riggs was awarded **\$44,000** from **Relationship Australia (SA)** for the *evaluation of an Aboriginal Healing Camp*.

Professor Phillip Slee and Associate Professor Shane Pill received \$59,800 in funding from Breakthrough and Little Heroes for *Child Mental Health Module - Out of School Hours Care* (OSCH).

Flinders University Enterprise PhD Scholarships Recipients

Dr Sam Elliott has been awarded two Flinders' Enterprise PhD Scholarships. The first PhD scholarship, titled *Understanding, developing, and evaluating a method for re-engaging young people in sport* is co-funded by the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing (South Australian Government). The other PhD scholarship, titled *Monkey See, Monkey do 2.0*, is co-funded by the Sammy D Foundation. Each of the scholarships includes a 60-day industry internship.

Associate Professor Ben Wadham is the recipient of an Enterprise PhD Scholarship titled *Helmets to hardhats: Veteran transition to the South Australian Construction Industry* co-funded by the Construction Industry Training Board (CITB). Military to civil transition is a challenging time for all veterans regardless of their service experience. Finding a new sense of identity, purpose and belonging can be mediated by the transition to secure and enjoyable employment. The PhD will research the four stages of a pipeline to employment from the military, and will investigate construction industry demand in the South Australian economy. Pre-transition preparation, skills assessment and translation, career coaching and apprentice and trainee award innovation form key pillars of the study. The study will adopt a social health and wellbeing perspective.

The PhDs Enterprise Scholarships are co-funded for \$57,000 each by industry and Flinders University.



Dr Monica Cations was awarded a scholarship to participate in the Science Meets Parliament 2022, one of 12 scholarships offered by Science & Technology, Australia (STA). STA is Australia's peak body for the science and technology sector. This scholarship allows Monica to attend the online 2022 Science Meets Parliament event, to meet with a Member of Parliament, and to attend the National Gala Dinner in Adelaide.

Associate Professor Lisa Beatty won the 'Best of the Best' Oral presentation award in translational research (\$750) at the Clinical Oncology Society of Australia's 48th Annual Scientific Meeting (Nov 16-18th 2021), for her presentation: *Finding My Way in the real world: How do outcomes of a digital psycho-oncology program compare from clinical trial to implementation?*

Matthew Flinders Fellow



Dr Oren Griffiths

Dr Oren Griffiths has been named a **Matthew Flinders Fellow** for his research into trial-and error learning. The award is "in recognition of his outstanding record of success and evidence of his commitment to research excellence, leadership and impact", and comes with a one-off grant of \$20,000. The award is for a period of five-year.

Oren's research biography states: "My research focuses upon the cognitive mechanisms implicated in learning and beliefupdating. My basic science examines how "trial and error" learning takes place, and the role of attention and beliefs in guiding learning. I am also interested in the cognitive mechanisms that bring about unsupported, idiosyncratic or erroneous beliefs (e.g. delusions, anomalous beliefs, superstitions). This research programme aligns with my primary clinical interest, which is in cognitive and behavioural therapies for psychosis (e.g. schizophrenia, bipolar, 1Ep).

His current project is titled Uncertainty and learning, selective attention, and their implications for our understanding of psychotic illness.


Presentations

- Lisa Beatty and her PhD Clin Psych student, Morgan Leske, had a 'supervisor vs supervisee' battle at the Clinical Oncology Society of Australia's 48th Annual Scientific Meeting (2021, November) Best of the Best Orals Translational Research session. In a field of six excellent presentations, both Lisa and Morgan's were well received. And a bit of fun was had too, creating a 'virtual Flinders hub' to deliver the presentations among the Flinders contingent of attendees. The two presentations were *Finding my way in the real world: How do outcomes of a digital psycho-oncology program compare from clinical trial to implementation?*, by Lisa Beatty; *Co-designing health living after Cancer Online, an online nutrition, physical activity and psychosocial intervention for post-treatment cancer survivors*, by Morgan Leske.
- In December 2020 Associate Professors Kerry Bissaker and Amy Hamilton together with Dr Michael Bell secured a \$107,000 grant from Australian Awards Indonesia to support 25 Indonesian educators and system leaders develop a series of projects designed to enhance knowledge and capacity in the application of 21st Century learning skills. Online workshops were held in 2021 with the outcomes of participants' projects presented on March 9th and 10th at a two-day conference. The conference was opened by Dr Iwan Syahril, Ph.D. Director General of Teachers and Education Personnel Ministry of Education, Culture, Research, and Technology which is an indication of the status of the project. The outcomes surpassed expectations given the challenges associated with online engagement.



Outcomes have served to change policies in some regencies with new education initiatives being implemented by local government, while other projects have generated a commitment to ongoing research and funding. The project also provided an extension of networks for participants, Flinders academics and a current PhD student Desiana Muliasari who provided active administration support to the overall project.

Dr Emma Kemp

Spotlight Series: ECR and Mid-Career Researchers

With the aim of raising awareness of the amazing early- and mid-career researchers within our College, we will be profiling and sharing the successes of a different ECR/MCR each month. It is my pleasure to introduce to you Dr Emma Kemp!!

Dr Ryan Balzan, ECR College Representative

When did you come to Flinders and what is your current role within the College?

I started working at Flinders in 2013 as the Study Coordinator for the RCT of *Finding My Way*, an online intervention for people recently diagnosed with early-stage cancer. Prior to that, my involvement with Flinders was when studying undergraduate Indonesian! These days, my main role is coordinating the RCT of *Finding My Way* – Advanced, an online intervention to improve quality of life for women with metastatic breast cancer. I'm also involved in several other projects, including research I'm leading on the impact of socioeconomic and geographic disadvantage and digital health literacy on engagement with digital health resources.

Can you briefly describe the work/research journey that took you to this point in your career?

I studied undergraduate psychology, and originally intended to work in clinical psychology. However, after completing Honours and having my first child I took a year out of university, and during this time realised a PhD and career in research was something I was interested in. I began my Study Coordinator role at Flinders a few months prior to submitting my PhD thesis. I had never worked in the cancer space prior to this, but I found the interesting and diverse work and supportive colleagues and collaborators really appealing. After my initial role, I became involved in scoping, co-design and feasibility studies to develop the Finding My Way – Advanced intervention, and a range of other survivorship projects that broadened my expertise across various aspects of cancer survivorship such as comorbidity, employment, and implementation of digital and other interventions for people with cancer.

What was your favourite part of being a postdoc and what was the hardest part of being a postdoc?

My favourite part of being a postdoc is being able to be hands on with the research that our team is working on, perhaps more so than senior academics who have a lot more on their plate in terms of meetings, teaching, and administration commitments. I really like being able to get stuck into a range of projects –there's a lot of opportunity for diversity of research in the psycho-oncology and cancer survivorship space. My least favourite part of being a postdoc is probably the same for almost everyone, i.e., the lack of security/continuity of employment – but I think that applies to a lot of jobs out there, not just early career research!

What is something you are most proud of?

I've recently been awarded a Flinders Foundation Health Seed Grant for the project I'm leading focusing on disadvantage and digital health literacy, and our team was awarded a Cancer Australia grant for the RCT of *Finding My Way – Advanced*. For both, it feels great to put the initial work into developing a trajectory of research and then have the value of this work recognised with a grant that allows you to keep going!

What are your future ambitions?

To use the Health Seed Grant as a springboard to develop a larger body of research addressing disadvantage and digital health literacy limitations in the implementation of digital health in cancer care. To me, it's all about being able to provide useful, relevant resources that promote engagement to support people going through a particularly difficult time in their lives.

How do you like to relax or spend your spare time?

As a working mum of three, 'spare time' is a scarce commodity for me, but I like to reset by catching up for weekend walks with one of my closest friends – we both live in the beautiful Adelaide Hills, and I find that getting out in the fresh air and superb scenery is a great way to get a clear headspace and reenergise for the week ahead. I also enjoy reading – which is something I share with my kids – and gardening, which I could do a lot more of!
