Dean of Research

Dear all,

The <u>Biggest</u> research news this year must be that the Excellence in Research for Australia (ERA) is no longer going ahead. The ERA is a massive undertaking and plans within the University and our College were well underway. Most of our outputs had been coded and a scenario modelling tool had been developed. While many people won't be sorry to see the end of ERA (pun intended), it's a pity in some ways. I think the University and our College were better prepared for ERA 2023 than in any other round – and that our disciplines had a chance to achieve better scores than ever before. One positive is that we currently have a clearer understanding of our research strengths than ever before. Many people in the College have put a lot of work into preparing for ERA and I would like to thank Jane Jarvis, Sarah Wendt, Tim Windsor, and Rebecca Vaughan for their work. It's currently not certain what will replace the ERA. I have heard talk of a data-informed approach and calls for machine-learning experts. We will see what eventuates.

The College is currently preparing for this year's Annual Performance and Accountability Cycle (APAC). This is where the College is required to make a presentation on all facets of our activity to the University Senior Executive. I have been writing the Research Report and I thought I would share some of the data relating to HDR performance. There are 181 HDR students enrolled in the College in 2022 and this number has been roughly stable for several years. This stability contrasts with the University, which has seen a decline over this period. The HDR load per academic staff FTE is 3.5 and this is higher than any other College and significantly higher than the University average (1.9). This demonstrates that academics in the College are highly engaged with HDR supervision. Our on-time completion rate for 2021 was 78.8% and this is significantly higher than the University average of 73.0%. Finally, we have one of the lowest attrition rates in the University (4.4%). All this points to excellent performance in HDR supervision and congratulations goes to the HDR supervisors, our students and the College HDR Committee.







Dr Andrew Bills, together with Nigel Howard, have been awarded **\$90,000** to undertake **The SACE Innovation Project** which works with teachers and leaders of three Specialised Assistance Schools (SAS) and the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) Board to understand how more SAS enrolled young people can access their educational entitlement. The project will seek to: Discover new ways to recognise senior school learning for young people dealing with mental health issues and poverty; experiment with and promote integrated forms of SACE curriculum design and pedagogies that offer therapeutic benefits; advise the SACE Board about presenting forms of disadvantage in these schools and how the SACE can be redesigned for these schools; better understand dimensions and approaches to "turnaround" pedagogies that better engage 'at risk' young people in learning; make inroads in unsettling Bourdieu's school reproduction theory that disadvantage in its various forms invariably leads to non-SACE completion.

Dr Michelle Jones and Dr Helen McLaren were awarded \$29,520.00 from the Women's and Children's Hospital for a research evaluation of My Place, Women's and Children's Health Network.

Spotlight Series: ECR and Mid-Career Researchers

With the aim of raising awareness of the amazing early- and mid-career researchers within our College, we will be profiling and sharing the successes of a different ECR/MCR each month. It is my pleasure to introduce to you Dr Serena Bauducco!!

Dr Ryan Balzan, ECR College Representative

When did you come to Flinders and what is your current role within the College?

I came to Flinders in June (2022) as an international postdoc, which means that I am affiliated with both Flinders and Örebro University (Sweden). My project aims at understanding the impact of technology use and online peer interactions on adolescents' sleep.

Can you briefly describe the work/research journey that took you to this point in your career?

I completed my Bachelor of Psychology at the University of Turin, Italy, where I am originally from. In 2009, I moved to Örebro, Sweden, as an exchange student and I stayed for the last 13 years. Although I originally intended to become a clinical psychologist, I became very interested in research while studying in Sweden. After completing a Master of Psychology and Prevention Science at the Örebro University, I started my PhD journey in a large project that aimed at following 3000 adolescents over 5 years to better understand risk and protective factors for the development of mental health problems. One of the focus areas of the project was sleep and that's when I became a sleep researcher. I defended my thesis in 2017, where I both explored risk and protective factors associated with poor sleep and tested a school-based intervention to improve sleep health in adolescents. After my PhD, I had a daughter, started teaching in the psychology program, and started writing grants. When I finally got the international postdoc grant (end of 2019) I had to postpone it, first because of baby n 2, and then because of the pandemic. It was not a straight and easy journey, especially these last two years, but I am happy we finally made it here.

What was your favourite part of being a postdoc and what was the hardest part of being a postdoc?

My favourite part of being a postdoc is being able to be creative, collaborate with other researchers, take the chance to learn new things, and really focus 100% on research. I also like the flexibility of being a postdoc and manage my own time, but it can also put a lot of pressure to perform, as improving one's research record is very important to secure a job afterwards. The lack of security is certainly not my favourite part of being a postdoc.

What is something you are most proud of?

I am proud of this postdoc opportunity, when I started dreaming of a postdoc on the other side of the world, I wasn't a mom yet and I am proud that I haven't changed my goals. I hope this will inspire my kids to pursue their dreams in the future.

What are your future ambitions?

My goal is to continue to work in the area of young people's sleep, because I believe focusing on improving sleep health has a great potential to promote mental health in this population. During my postdoc at Flinders, I want to expand my toolbox with experimental studies and direct measures of sleep, such as PSG. I also want to continue improving the school-based intervention that I developed during my PhD. I am passionate about research in this area and I can see many aspects that we still need to explore. So, my ambition is to continue in a research role, and keep learning!

How do you like to relax or spend your spare time?

Spare time is precious having a young family, and luckily, we all love nature and try to spend as much time as possible outside – we just swapped the Swedish woods for the Australian beaches. I also love animals and used to ride horses, something I hope I will get to do more in the near future. In the evenings, I like watching movies/TV series with my husband (a true movie nerd!) and reading books (at this moment, about the history of Australia).

External Engagement

Professor Murray Drummond, SHAPE Research Centre Director, will present the keynote address at The Australian Council for Health, Physical Education and Recreation (ACHPER) South Australia Primary Conference on Monday 26 September. Murray will share his research knowledge on the role of sport and mental health in the lives of young people, setting the scene for the remainder of the conference that will offer best practice strategies and programs to support students in Health and Physical Education, Physical Activity and Wellbeing.

HDR Student Activity

The SHAPE Research Centre is abuzz with the energy and enthusiasm of **twenty** enrolled and motivated PhD students. The **CEPSW HDR Conference** was held Monday 19 September with 34 HDR students presenting.

With two recently commencing industry PhD students, there are currently three industry PhDs underway at SHAPE:

James Kay was awarded an Enterprise PhD Scholarship, with his research aiming to develop a method for re-engaging youth back into organised sport. Jointly funded by Flinders University and the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing, James will be supervised by Dr Sam Elliott, Professor Murray Drummond, and Dr Jasmine Petersen. James' study aims to understand contemporary dropout behaviour among youth, develop an evidence-based method for re-engaging youth into sport, and to implement and evaluate this new method in a local sporting context. James hopes his research will be a game-changer for South Australia and beyond.





Emilea Mysko has received an Enterprise PhD Scholarship to support the work of the Sammy D Foundation. With Dr Sam Elliott's supervision, Emilea will research the nuanced role of parents as role models for children and use youth sports as the social setting for this modelling. The project will include a 60-day internship with the Sammy D Foundation and will follow the Sammy D Foundations' Violence Prevention and Positive Role Modelling program, called the 'Monkey See Monkey Do Program', which has so far been presented to more than 6000 participants at 83 South Australian sporting clubs. Emilea hopes her research will lead to a greater understanding for both researchers and parents about the impact of parental sideline behaviour.

Emma Milanese commenced her industry-funded PhD in 2021. Supported by Flinders University, the Roger Rasheed Foundation and the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing, Emma is investigating the significance of sport in the lives of young people in low socioeconomic status (SES) communities. The Morton Road project in Christie Downs – with its new oval, skate park, tennis courts and accompanying programs – will be at the forefront of Emma's research. Emma's PhD will discover and measure how first-rate sporting facilities and opportunities can lift the lives of children and adults living in impoverished areas – being the first research of its type in Australia.

- 3. Peer reviewed journal articles, refereed conference papers, book chapters only (not reviews) and books will be accepted.
- 4. The student must only submit one publication for an award each year.

Submission

Applicants should submit the following for review by the College:

- 1. Copy of the publication
- 2. Month the research output was published
- 3. A justification of why the publication is important
- 4. Number of citations
- 5. Impact Factor of the journal or refereed conference paper
- 6. Ranking of the journal in their field
- 7. For multi-authored publications, the relative contribution of each of the authors to the publication (% for the following components: research design; data collection and analysis; and writing and editing)
- 8. A letter of support from the Supervisor that includes additional evidence about the importance of the publication specific to the field of study

Please send through your publication, a letter of support from your principal supervisor (and other details as per the above) to cepsw.research@flinders.edu.au by **Monday 28 November 2022** to enable us sufficient time for HDR committee members to read and make our recommendation for this prestigious prize.
