Dr Alexandra Wade

Spotlight Series: ECR and Mid-Career Researchers

With the aim of raising awareness of the amazing early- and mid-career researchers within our College, we will be profiling and sharing the successes of a different ECR/MCR each month. It is my pleasure to introduce to you Dr Alexandra Wade!! Dr Ryan Balzan, ECR College Representative

When did you come to Flinders and what is your current role within the College?

I'm very new to the world of Flinders! I began my position as a Research Fellow two weeks ago with the Generations Initiative. I will be working on a new project that aims to adapt, validate and implement a screening tool for the early detection of Alzheimer's disease.

Can you briefly describe the work/research journey that took you to this point in your career?

I completed my Bachelor's degree in Psychology at UniSA back in 2011 and briefly worked as a project officer in education research and learning analytics. I was encouraged to pursue a PhD and decided to change lanes and focus on a personal interest of mine: nutrition and cognition. I was aware of some research in the area at UniSA, and sought out a PhD supervisor in the field of health sciences, with support from psychology. My PhD thesis focused on the cardiovascular and cognitive benefits of the Mediterranean diet, and included two randomised controlled trials testing the effects of the Mediterranean diet in populations at risk of dementia. I also conducted an analysis of longitudinal diet and cognition data in collaboration with researchers at the University of Maine. After completing my PhD, I successfully secured a postdoc position at UniSA and coordinated a multi-site cohort study aiming to characterise optimal diets and physical activity patterns for dementia prevention. During my postdoc, I undertook several additional roles, including establishing the Australia Dementia Network Screening and Trials program at SAHMRI. Last year I also reduced my academic fraction to 0.2FTE to take on an industry role in research impact and knowledge translation.

What is your favourite part of being a postdoc and what is the hardest part of being a postdoc?

My favourite part of being a postdoc might also be one of the hardest parts – the many, varied opportunities! There's so much on offer and so many avenues to explore. At the same time, it can be hard to say no, and there are only so many hours in the day.

What is something you are most proud of?

I'm a strong believer in the need for effective science communication and research translation. Throughout my PhD and postdoc, I had the opportunity to engage with the media, and I am proud that I was able to share the findings of my work internationally to reach global audiences. I'm also proud of the translation work I have done more locally, engaging with community groups to share research findings and to evaluate the effectiveness of council programs for health and well-being.

What are your future ambitions?

My career objective is to continue building and translating evidence and resources that can contribute to healthy ageing through dementia prevention. By working with key stakeholders and conducting collaborative research, my goal is to guide professional practice and policy and generate real world impact.

How do you like to relax or spend your spare time?

With a toddler, spare time can be hard to find. I love spending time with my daughter and exploring the world again through her eyes. When she's finally asleep, I also love relaxing with my husband, watching tv and movies, reading, cooking, painting, and drawing.

Library Authentication Update...

Earlier this year, the Library transitioned its authentication system for accessing subscription resources. Our new authentication, known as OpenAthens, provides a range of benefits for all users, including:

- A single sign-on approach for all resources •
- More secure, reliable, and transparent then EZproxy IP recognition; and •
- An overall better user experience. •

However, any links to subscription resources using our former authentication system will become invalid as of July 3rd.

Artificial Intelligence and Digital Literacy

As part of efforts to support students develop competencies in the use of artificial intelligence tools, the Library has codelivered two workshops:

- Data and Digital Literacy Workshop, as part of the Horizon program. This workshop was updated to include references to recent AI developments and tools, with time allocated to discuss student use, experiences and reflections.
- Legal research workshop, as part of LLAW1312 Essential Legal Skills. Students reflected on the accuracy and relevance of a ChatGPT response to a legal scenario, using a series of questions based on the Using Al tools for study guide.

SHAPE researchers sharing their expertise

Professor Murray Drummond was interviewed on **5AA** interview this month alongside John Mannion from the Breakthrough Mental Health Research Foundation. They discussed the promotion of **mental health initiatives within sporting clubs**. The SHAPE Research Centre team have been working extensively with Breakthrough Mental Health Foundation on a range of research projects and initiatives around promoting mental health in sporting clubs. This interview highlighted the work they have been doing and provided ideas and strategies for listeners of 5AA involved in sporting clubs at all levels.

The **Women in Sport Taskforce** were fortunate to hear from **PhD candidate James Kay** who presented his research on re-engaging adolescent females in sport. The Women in Sport Taskforce, led by Hon Katrine Hildyard and of which Professor Murray Drummond is a member, is working to raise the profile and participation levels of girls and women in sport and to address inequality that inhibits girls and women from actively and equally participating in the sport they love.

The **Sunday Mail featured an article on "bigorexia"** (<u>3 June 2023</u>), highlighting the impact of social media influencers on the body image of boys and young men. **Professor Murray Drummond** shared his concern about the source of young people's training regimes, "Young people are getting a lot of their weight training programs from these so-called experts on TikTok," Dr Drummond said, and stressed the importance of understanding the context behind the bodies seen on social media.

ARC Mid-Career Industry Fellowships

The **ARC Mid-Career Industry Fellowship** scheme for funding in 2024 (IM24) will be opening on **Wednesday 5th July**. If you are intending to apply to this scheme, please **register your intent** by reply email to <u>ARC@flinders.edu.au</u> (cc'ing <u>cepsw.research@flinders.edu.au</u>), **no later than Friday 30th June**. This will assist with targeted support and allows us to provide relevant information for the new round as it becomes available.

The round is for Mid-Career researchers who have 5-15 years of relevant experience. Applications much include at least one Key Industry Partner.

The Mid-Career Industry Fellowship scheme aims to:

- strengthen the industry collaboration skills of mid-career researchers
- encourage uptake of a wider range of career options for established researchers
- supervise and develop future research and nurture their development of collaboration, commercialisation and translation skills; and
- deliver significant, actionable outcomes for industry partners and end-users.

The successful applicant will receive:

- a contribution to salary and salary related oncosts of \$199,824* per year for 2-4 consecutive years on a full-time basis
- project costs not exceeding \$290,000* may be requested over the duration of the grant

HDR Spotlight

This month we'll hear from one of our PhD student on their HDR journey so far: Lucy Bird, PhD Psychology Candidate.

HDR Spotlight on Lucy Bird

What's the overview of your PhD?

My thesis looks at political despair in the contexts of climate change and racial inequality. I consider what leads to people experiencing despair about the social-political status-quo, and what impacts despair may have on individuals' well-being and their willingness to engage in the democratic process (e.g., signing petitions, donations, rallies, voting). My final experiment investigates three potential interventions to mitigate the negative implications political despair has on well-being and engagement in actions to promote social change.

What is something that you have enjoyed during your PhD?

I have enjoyed meeting new people and learning new skills. The most enjoyable experience though has been helping to organise and then attending and presenting at a conference that our lab hosted last year (General Meeting of The Society of Australasian Social Psychologists).

What has been the biggest challenge?

The biggest challenge during the PhD is staying motivated especially when you are stuck and having issues in your research. There is also a lot of self-doubt and imposter syndrome as a PhD student which can be hard to deal with.



What advice do you have for someone starting their PhD?

My advice would be to attend things like conferences where you meet fun, like-minded people. It gives you a better perspective on why you're doing research and the community that you are involved with.

As PhD students we have access to funding to attend conferences (\$1000 for domestic, \$1500 for international, note that the maximum you can access for travel is \$1500). You can also apply for funding through FUSA and the university wide HDR Travel Grant in the scholarship portal of the Flinders Student System. All the information can be found on the FLO pages for the CEPSW. The FUSA grant and the university wide travel grant are both competitive, so to make yourself more likely to be successful, try and have multiple things lined up for your travels. For example, I am attending a big conference in Poland this year. I am also attending a preconference for it. Therefore, I was more competitive as I would be presenting at 2 events, so Flinders gets more bang-for-their-buck! Other students often attend multiple conferences/pre-conferences in the one trip as quite often conferences in similar fields are hosted at similar times.

Attending conferences (especially overseas) will be the highlight of the PhD experience because you get to engage with great people and innovative research, develop skills whilst also getting to see the world and having fun! So, make sure you apply for the conferences and apply for all the funding you're eligible for.
