Dear all.

It's been another busy month for the Research team within the College. At a recent University Research Committee meeting it was highlighted that there are a huge number of reviews and external drivers shaping the research environment at present – from the University Accord, and the SA Productivity Commission's report on "turning research into economic competitiveness"; to AUKUS and the release of Strategic Defence Review; and a review of Australia's Science and Research Priorities. This past month the ARC Independent Review Final Report was released and can be found here. It's a 76 page-long page-turner but contains some interesting breadcrumbs for those who like to anticipate what the ARC may do next in terms of its governance and review processes.



At the same University Research Committee meeting we discussed the relatively low numbers of Australian Research Council Discovery applications from across the University, including our College, this year. Our College has recently had a good track record of success with ARC Discovery Projects and there is a lot of collective wisdom to be shared in the formulation of a competitive application. If you are considering submitting one in 2024, please do reach out soon to your Research Section Head to start planning your campaign with them.



Specifically, we will now have Flinders University Vice Chancellor's Awards for: Early Career Researchers; Mid-career researchers; Research leadership (Senior research award); Research Impact and Engagement (research team); Research Impact and Engagement (ECR); Research Impact and Engagement (MCR). It is very clear to me from the achievements described in the newsletter below that we have a lot of high calibre people doing very impactful work in the College so please keep an eye out for when these are called and consider applying.

Research.com: Best Psychology Scientists in Australia

2023 Edition of Research.com Ranking of Best Scientists in the Field of Psychology

The 2nd edition of Research.com ranking of the best scientists in the field of Psychology relies on data combined from various data sources including OpenAlex and CrossRef. The bibliometric data for devising the citation-based metrics were collected on 21-12-2022. Position in the ranking is based on a scientist's D-index (Discipline H-index), which takes into account only publications and citation data for an examined discipline. The best scientists ranking is a reliable account of leading researchers from the area of Psychology, established by means of a meticulous examination of 166,880 researchers discovered from multiple bibliometric data sources.

For the field of Psychology, over 15,018 scientists were investigated, with the D-index threshold for approving a scholar to be considered is placed at 30 if most of their publications are in the discipline of Psychology.

Emerita Professor Stella Vosniadou

Humboldt Research Awardee



Stella Vosniadou, Emerita Professor of Education, was awarded the Humboldt Research Award in recognition of her academic achievements. The Humboldt Research Award, or the Humboldt Prize, is given by Alexander von Humboldt Foundation of Germany to internationally renowned scientists and scholars who work outside Germany in recognition of their lifetime's research achievements. The prize comes with 60,000 euros, with the possibility of further support.

Stella has been involved in joined research with German colleagues on the ARC Discovery Project on *Teaching how to learn*.

Teaching how to learn: Promoting self-regulated learning in STEM classes. Australian Research Council, DP190102366

 \$485,000 (2018-2022) with Stella Vosniadou (Project Leader) and Michael Lawson (Flinders University), Lorraine Graham (The University of Melbourne), Charlotte Dignath (Goethe University Frankfurt) and Michaelene Chi (Arizona State University).

The project investigates in-service and pre-service teachers' knowledge, beliefs and practices related to the creation of learning environments that support student cognitive engagement and the development of the capabilities of self-regulated learners. In collaboration with Michael Lawson from Flinders University and Lorraine Graham from the University of Melbourne, the project has produced several publications and two professional learning courses for teachers, which we hope will form the basis for two micro credential courses at Flinders. The research findings of the project were presented in a featured symposium at the annual conference of the Australian Association for Research in Education, Melbourne, November 29-31, 2021, and were published in the Educational Practices Series of the International Bureau of Education of the UNESCO.

The Humboldt Research Grant will make possible the dissemination of the research findings in Germany and more generally in the European context. Professor Vosniadou has been active in the European Association for Research on Learning and Instruction (EARLI), which she served as a past president and from which she received in 2021 the Oeuvre Award in recognition of her research contributions.

Spotlight Series: ECR and Mid-Career Researchers

With the aim of raising awareness of the amazing early- and mid-career researchers within our College, we will be profiling and sharing the successes of a different ECR/MCR each month. It is my pleasure to introduce to you Dr Alhassan Abdullah!!

Dr Ryan Balzan, ECR College Representative

When did you come to Flinders and what is your current role within the College?

I joined Flinders in September 2022. I am a Lecturer in Social Work (Balanced role). I teach topics across the undergraduate and postgraduate social work curricula. I also coordinate the Bachelor of Social Work Honours course in the discipline. My research background is in the area of child welfare and family wellbeing, with research themes on child maltreatment prevention, community-based child protection practice and culture within child protection.

Can you briefly describe the work/research journey that took you to this point in your career?

I started full-time research work right after my Bachelor of Social Work Honours degree in Ghana. I spent two years working as a Research Assistant on an international collaborative project on child protection. Knowledge obtained through the Research Assistant work strengthened my desire to pursue a PhD in the same field. I started my PhD in 2019, at the University of Hong Kong (HKU). At HKU, I had the opportunity to work on projects in Southeast Asia and gained cross cultural experience in the field of child protection and family wellbeing. I spent my final PhD year at Haverford College, United States, as a visiting research scholar, while working on my first independent grant project. I will say that my PhD study period was a mixture of "many things". In addition to my core PhD thesis, I won two international competitive early career research grants from the International Labour Organization (ILO) and UNICEF, and collaborated on several international projects. I moved to Flinders right after defending my PhD thesis. This is the first time I am engaged in fairly balanced academic role, teaching and research (albeit unbalanced in reality). So far, I am settling in and trying to establish my research within Australia.

What is something you are most proud of?


I am very proud of my academic achievements, and my journey so far, but I am most proud of the impact of my research and teaching. I feel honoured to have shaped policy, practice, and indirectly affected vulnerable children positively through my research. While still an early career academic, I feel proud to have mentored four students who are currently pursuing their PhDs in the USA and UK on prestigious PhD followships. Feedback from my students (including Flinders University students) regarding my teaching has been excellent, and I take that as a great achievement.

What are your future ambitions?

I want to continue to grow in this role and be an effective educator, mentor, and an internationally recognised expert in child welfare. I hope to improve my research output and impact and continue to engage in ground-breaking research to make a difference in the lives of vulnerable children and their family.

How do you like to relax or spend your spare time?

Watching football, and spending time with my 6 weeks old boy.



First-time Parenting Journeys: Expectations and Realities

Damien Riggs & Clare Bartholomaeus

All too often heterosexual first-time parents are treated as the unmarked norm within research on reproduction. First-Time Parenting Journeys maps out what it means to be situated within the norm, while providing a critical account of how social norms about parenthood shape, regulate, and potentially delimit experiences of new parenthood for heterosexual couples. Based on qualitative longitudinal research, this book tells the story of journeys to parenthood, highlighting the impact of gender norms, moral claims, emotion work, and generativity. While drawing on Australian data, the critical conceptual framework has broader applicability across Western contexts in terms of understanding normative family structures and parenting practices. By focusing on expectations about, and the reality of, new parenthood, it explicates the ways in which institutionalised norms about parenthood are internalised and explores what this can tell us about the broader contours of parenthood discourses.

Teaching Games and Sport for Understanding

Shane Pill, Ellen-Alyssa F. Gambles, & Linda L. Griffin (Eds.)

This new book brings together leading and innovative thinkers in the field of teaching and sport coaching pedagogy to provide a range of perspectives on teaching games and sport for understanding. Each chapter raises issues that can resonate with the teacher and sport practitioner and researcher. In this way, the chapters can assist one to make sense of their own teaching or sport coaching, provide deeper insight into personal conceptualisations of the concept of game-based teaching and sport coaching or stimulate reflections on their own teaching or coaching or the contexts they are involved in. Teaching games and sport for understanding in various guises and pedagogical models has been proposed as leading practice for session design and instructional delivery of sport teaching in PE and sport coaching since the late 1960s. At its core, it is a paradigm shift from what can be described as a behaviourist model of highly directive instruction for player replication of teacher/coach explanation and demonstration to instructional models that broadly are aimed at the development of players self-autonomy as self-regulated learners -'thinking players'.



Library Satisfaction Survey: Tell us what you think (15-28 May 2023)





HDR Spotlight on Tess Barich

What is the overview of your PhD?

My project is concerned with how we detect and respond to threats such as spiders and guns in the different visual fields. I am in the final nine months of my PhD, and I am just wrapping up the last experiment in my series this week: EXP10.

What is something that you have enjoyed during your PhD?

I really enjoyed learning a whole lot of new skills, from taking a course on effective presentation skills to learning how to program and build my own heart rate monitor; it's been a really positive experience overall.

What has been the biggest challenge?

I found the biggest struggle I have faced so far in my candidature is bouncing back from being burnt out. Learning how to maintain consistent work hours and create time for relaxation was really challenging, but necessary to allow me to continue on healthily with the PhD.

What advice do you have for someone starting their PhD?

My best piece of advice is to make sure you do have consistent work and relaxation hours. Doing so will proactively help protect against burnout, which can be a really tough thing to come back from.
