Celebrating Achievements

ARC DP24

Associate Professor Tim Windsor, Dr Stephanie Wong, and Partner Investigator Dr Serena Sabatini (University of Nottingham, UK) were funded an ARC DP24 of \$685,081 for the project *Ageism refers to stereotypes, prejudice and discrimination towards people based on their age*. This project aims to generate new knowledge in relation to older Australians' experiences of ageism by conducting a population-based survey of ageism and examining its links with mental health and wellbeing. The project will also use intensive longitudinal methods to study everyday ageism. Expected outcomes include identification of at-risk groups that can be used to inform government policy responses to tackling ageism and will inform the development of interventions and education programs to reduce ageism in the community. This should provide significant benefits for social inclusion, intergenerational solidarity and economic participation.

Department of Education, Training and Skills

Associate Professor Shane Pill, Professor Phillip Slee and Associate Professor Deb Agnew were awarded \$169,000 from the Department of Education, Training and Skills for the project *Big Talks for Little People: Child Mental Health Program for Primary School Health and Physical Education (HPE) Mental Health Education.*

Department of Veteran Affairs

Professor Ben Wadham together with Professor Sharon Lawn (lead-CI) were awarded \$41,533 in contract research funding from the Department of Veteran's Affairs for the project *Survey of DVA staff and culture*.

Flinders University Impact Seed Funding for ECRs

Dr Ben Lohmeyer is one of five early career researchers who received a 2023 Impact Seed Funding grant. Ben's project it titled *Mapping early-life loneliness in built environments: Piloting a model for co-research with young people from the SA Youth Forum*, and received \$9,991 in funding.

SANFL Industry PhD Scholarship

Associate Professor Sam Elliott and Professor Murray Drummond received a \$135,500 Industry PhD Scholarship from the South Australian National Football League (SANFL) for the project *AFL Gather Round Legacy and Impact on South Australian communities*.

HTSA MRFF Catalyst Grant Scheme

Professor Tracey Wade, together with J. Coelho, Dr Mia Pellizzer, T. Mclean, B. Caldwell, M. Norris, T. Withington, Dr Laura Edney, A. McGregor, and R. Long, were awarded \$56,979 from the HTSA MRFF Catalyst Grant Scheme for the project *Introduction of on-line family-based group treatment for parents of children with eating disorders as first line treatment* whilst waiting for face-to-face treatment: Cost-consequence and cost savings analyses.



Sixth Annual Stanford-Elsevier Standardised Citation Index

Flinders' researchers have been listed among the top 2% of scientists globally in the recent Stanford-Elsevier standardised citation index. Congratulations to Professor Damien Riggs who is ranked eighth in the world for the field of social work with rankings based on number of citations, and to Associate Professor Dan King who is listed amongst the top 10 Australian researchers in his field.

Social Influence in the Grey Zone

Multi-level influence for engagement and resilience

On the 1st of November, Professor Emma Thomas, together with co-authors Associate Brad West (University of South Australia), Cassandra Quarisa (PhD Candidate, Flinders University), and Damien Spry, a Senior Social Influence Researcher in the Human and Decision Sciences Division of the Defence Science and Technology Group, launched a major white paper. The report focus states:



"In an era of grey zone conflict, hybrid warfare, strategic competition, malign foreign interference and regional engagement, the need to understand influence, in its various forms, has never been more urgent and important. The report addresses these by drawing on best practice and leading research in the fields of social psychology, sociology and international relations. It highlights how insights from these and cognate fields can contribute to national security and international engagement for a more secure and stable region." The Last Post

In <u>Issue 31</u> of the Last Post, the article The Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide was published. As part of the Royal Commission's investigations a number of studies and research reports have been commissioned and published, including Open Door's Mapping service and transition to self-harm and suicidality. The article states: "The principal finding from this research is that violence within the ranks is an inherent and systematic part of any military and the ADF. This occurs because the ADF trains people in the use of violence against an enemy but fails to recognise the potential it creates among its own people. Because the ADF wants to optimise the potential for violence it is shy of taming it within the ADF workforce. The result is that the bright-eyed recruit or cadet is traumatised and morally injured or betrayed by the institution they had respected and given so much service and loyalty to. This source of trauma leads to self-medication and substance abuse, leading to suicidal thoughts, attempts or the actual taking of one's life. The report highlights the paradox of military service, that the training in and use of violence is double edged and leads to poor morale and damage to the ADF's most previous resource – people."

This landmark event brought together over 140 delegates from across the globe to the Tonsley campus, fostering a vibrant exchange of knowledge and expertise in the field of youth sport.



Impact Seed Funding

Dr Ben Lohmeyer was awarded a \$9,991 Flinders University Impact Seed Fund for Early Career Researchers for the project Mapping Early-life Loneliness in Built Environments: Piloting a model for co-research with young people from the SA Youth Forum.

This project aims to pilot a method to investigate how young people navigate loneliness in built environments. Loneliness has been thought to predominantly impact older people, yet young people (18-25 years) in Australia are more likely than any other age group to experience loneliness. Furthermore, cutting-edge research is now interrogating the phenomenon as an emotional experience in built environments. In partnership with the South Australian Youth Forum, this project will create a method of working with young people as coresearchers to address the critical lack of research on young people's experiences of loneliness in built environments.

Leading world researchers, industry figures and policy makers attended the National Youth Sport Conference to help improve outcomes in youth sports- from understanding the role of sleep, getting the best out of coaching to creating a dynamic pipeline for the next generation of players.

Dr Grace Skrzypiec is the lead author of the article *The confounding and problematic nexus of defined and perceived bullying* explains that bullying is a broad term open to widely varying interpretations, and it's a reality that leads to cases being missed or under-reported- especially by children. Butterfly Let's Talk podcast. *ANZAED 23: Still more to learn from the latest research*, featuring Dr Simon Wilksch about the financial and emotional costs that families face when caring for children with eating disorders and in order to improve outcomes the recommendation is that parents and caregivers also receive support.
- **30 October 2023**. Psych.org; Geelong Advertiser; Gold Coast Bulletin. *High engagement, high return: The secret to student success*. Article by lead-author Professor Stella Vosniadou highlighted research findings that less than a third of teachers are engaging students in complex learning, limiting student opportunities for building critical thinking and problem solving. It is recommended that teachers are supported to plan interactive and constructive lessons that promote deep learning. (EducationDaily, 2 November)
- **5 October 2023**. The Advertiser. 'Maybe we should go on a diet together': SA school kids are encouraging each other to start dangerous dieting trends, featuring research findings by Dr Simon Wilksch that found that rates of disordered eating were as high as 52 per cent. Almost 1000 year 7 and 8 students from SA and WA participated in this study. Professor Tracey Wade commented that adolescents can fall into dangerous dieting habits quite quickly with lasting negative impacts.



HDR Spotlight on Matt Thompson

What's the overview of your PhD?

My research looks at micro-interventions for people at-risk of developing eating disorders. Micro-interventions are brief, immediately actionable interventions that are readily available for consumers whenever they want/need them. It is hoped that these interventions will not just be efficacious in reducing risk factors, but will be more widely utilised by a population that is notoriously difficult to reach.



What has been the biggest challenge?

Navigating uncertainty. The first 10-months of my PhD were particularly challenging, juggling coursework for my clinical training, work commitments and trying to come up with a plan for what my PhD actually was. I found this not knowing what my PhD would end up being and constantly feeling like I was falling behind really difficult.

What advice do you have for someone starting their PhD? Reach out to others for advice! Whenever I feel like everything is going wrong with my PhD (which is very often), I find it very reassuring to speak with my peers. It is amazing how often they have had similar issues and can provide support and advice. A PhD becomes a lot easier when you can make a few friends!
