Guildhouse and Flinders University Art Museum are delighted to present *UTE-ilitarian* by Austrian born, Adelaide-based artist Cynthia Schwertsik as part of the 2019 SALA Festival.

Commenting on Australia's ecological footprint, Schwertsik will present new video and performance work at Flinders University's Bedford Park campus, with an official launch on Thursday 8 August 2019.

Schwertsik's work traverses the genres of visual art and contemporary performance, while also incorporating active inclusion. In her practice she engages with and navigates the everyday world utilising common objects (such as chairs) and public spaces (such as footpaths), often subverting their familiar functionality and societal roles with humorous interventions.

This new work has resulted from the Guildhouse Collections Project with Flinders University Art Museum, an initiative which provides South Australian artists with unique opportunities to research and respond to extraordinary State collections.









Schwertsik explored the Post-object and Documentation collection held by Flinders University Art Museum. Initiated by Donald Brook, the collection includes photographs, artist books, prints and audio-visual material that document Australia's conceptual art making of the 1960s and 70s within the context of the international movement. Schwertsik's new work specifically responds to artworks in the collection by Aleks Danko, Tim and Vivien Johnson, and David Thorp.

Cynthia Schwertsik says "In Australia, my ecological footprint as a daily commuter consists of numerous bitumen-laid carparks. In my new work I reimagine chairs as cars and consider bitumen as an inscription on the earth for societal convenience. UTE-ilitarian is my absurd, unsustainable grappling of Australian everyday norms."

Guildhouse Chief Executive Officer Emma Fey and Flinders University Art Museum Director Fiona Salmon say, 'By opening the collections in this way, not only do artists benefit from direct and extended engagement with works of art, but their readings and responses facilitate alternative ways of seeing, experiencing and understanding artworks and their histories for both the Art Museum and its audiences.'
