Admission requirements

- In accordance with section 2.1 and 2.2 of the PhD Course Rule.
- Refer to the FAQ about how to apply for the PhD by Prior Published Work.

Supervision arrangements

• In accordance with Section 4 of the <u>HDR Supervisor Policy</u>, only a Principal Supervisor is required for the PhD on the basis of Prior Published Work.

Enrolment Duration

• In accordance with Section 4.5 of the <u>HDR Policy</u>, the enrolment duration for a PhD on the basis of Prior Published Work is 6 months full-time or 1 year part-time.

Progression

- Section 5.3 of the <u>Course Rule</u> for the Doctor of Philosophy candidature on the basis of Prior Published Work outlines the requirements for the program of study:
 - 5.3 In a Doctor of Philosophy by Prior Published Work, the student will undertake a short program of work culminating in a thesis comprising a contextual statement and a body of published work accumulated prior to acceptance into candidature.
- In accordance with Section 5 of the HDR Progression Procedures.

PhD by Prior Published Work Thesis

- In accordance with Section 8 of the HDR Thesis Rules.
- In addition to the relevant publications intended for examination, and all the matters listed in the HDR Thesis Rules 3 to 5, the thesis must include:
 - A contextual statement (but not a detailed reworking of individual publications) which includes:
 the aims underpinning the publications a commentary which establishes the field of knowledge
 within current literature (literature review) how the publications are linked, and a conclusion
 showing the overall significance of the work and contribution to knowledge, problems
 encountered and future directions of the work
 - A statement which indicates which portions of the published works are claimed to be original.
 - A summary of the student's career review, professional expertise, number of publications and the citations they have attracted. Further, any translational research that emerged from them – specify. Further alternative metrics – such as altmetrics can be used.
 - The thesis should build this story to demonstrate how the publications have created a body of knowledge that verifies an original contribution to knowledge.
